Leonard Tate was the poet laureate of Grundy County, living from 1912 until 1989. He spent most of his life in working and writing in Beersheba Springs, Tn. The compilation of his work, *All the Lost Octobers* was published posthumously by the Beersheba Historical Society.

The Mocking Bird


A song came to me As I lay in the grass, And then disappeared, Like breath from a glass.
